



## To fill ash jewellery or urn

### Ash jewellery

You can tell the crematorium that you want to use a little of the ashes, and they will keep some for you. The jewellery has a small screw-top at the top, bottom or back. Check for damage before you fill the jewellery.

### Filling

Pour the ashes in the opening using a small funnel or a folded piece of paper. Unscrew the top by hand, a pincer might damage the jewellery. Use a large piece of paper on a straight surface to easily gather any spills.

If the ashes are too coarse you can powder them with a mortar and pestle. If necessary, tamp down the ashes with a wooden toothpick.



Check to see that nothing sticks to the screw by closing it once **without** glue. Clean if necessary, then we advise you to put a drop of glue on the inner screw and close the top. Make sure that the hook on the top is well aligned with the rest of the jewellery when you put on the chain. Do not re-open (the top might become unstuck or it might leak.) **Remove** excess glue.

### Wearing

Do not expose to water. An ash jewel is never fully watertight; or it may be harmed, damaged or worn down by salt, detergents, soap and/or sweat.

### Urn

#### First

Depending on the model you can indicate to the crematorium whether you want the ashes in a bag or a tin. Check the urn for damage before filling and gluing.

#### To fill

Make sure you fill the urn on a flat surface and a sufficiently large piece of paper, so any spills may easily be gathered with a flat brush. We have urns in stock with a screw top, a lid or a glue-on plate. Especially if you place the urn outside, we advise you to glue it. We cannot be held responsible for damage from filling and gluing.
